



Did you know?



- 1. Reading is the most important subject in school. A child needs reading in order to master most of the other subjects.
- 2. In third grade, students transition from learning to read to reading to learn. Third-graders who aren't reading at grade level are four times more likely to drop out of high school than their reading proficient peers.
- 3. It's estimated that over \$2 billion is spent each year on students who repeat a grade because they have reading problems.
- 4. 85 percent of all juvenile offenders have reading problems.
- 5. The more literate adults are, the more likely they'll be employed full time in good jobs with benefits. Average weekly earnings increase with each level of literacy.
- 6. The educational careers of 25-40 percent of American children are imperiled because they don't read well enough, quickly enough or easily enough.

Reading Begins at Home:

Strong parental involvement is a key component of the *Read-at-Home Plan*. Other than helping your children to grow up happy and healthy, the most important thing that you can do for them is help them develop their reading skills.

Suggestions to help build your child's reading skills:

Kindergarten

- Read predictable books to your child. Teach him to hear and say repeating words, such as names for colors, numbers, letters and animals. Predictable books help children to understand how stories progress. A child easily learns familiar phrases and repeats them, pretending to read.
- Practice the sounds of language by reading books with rhymes and playing simple word games (i.e. How many words can you make up that sound like the word "bat"?)

First Grade

- Point out the letter-sound relationships your child is learning on labels, boxes, newspapers and magazines.
- Listen to your child read words and books from school. Be patient and listen as he practices.
 Let him/her know you are proud of his/her reading.

Second & Third Grade

- Build reading accuracy by having your child read aloud and point out words he/she missed and help him/her read words correctly. If you stop to focus on a word, have your child reread the whole sentence to be sure she understands the meaning.
- Echo and repeated readings of text selection will improve fluency and increase comprehension.

Fourth & Fifth Grade

- Build reading fluency by having your child reread familiar books.
- Build stamina by making 30 minutes of reading a daily routine in your home.
- Build reading accuracy by having your child read aloud and point out words he/she missed and help him/her read words correctly. If you stop to focus on a word, have your child reread the whole sentence to be sure she understands the meaning.
- Build reading comprehension by talking with your child about what he/she is reading. Ask
 about new words. Talk about what happened in a story. Ask about the characters, places,
 and events that took place. Ask what new information he/she has learned from the book.
 Encourage him/her to read independently.



A MESSAGE FROM SUPERINTENDENT ALBERTO M. CARVALHO



As you may have heard, I will be ending my tenure as Superintendent of Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) to lead the Los Angeles Unified School District. While excited for this opportunity, it is bittersweet as I will be leaving the community I love - a vibrant, diverse community

that welcomed me with open arms as an undocumented immigrant. Over the past 30 years, I have devoted my career to public education, which I believe is the cornerstone of our democracy.

Through your support and partnership over the years, M-DCPS has become

a national model for educational excellence and innovation. Together, we turned what seemed like an impossible situation - financial crisis, low-performing schools at risk of closure by the State, and a 58 percent graduation rate - into an inevitable success story. Since 2008, we have reimagined what is possible for the children of Miami-Dade, receiving the 2012 Broad Prize for Urban Education, often considered the Nobel Prize in the field, as well as the 2014 College Board Advanced Placement Equity and Excellence District of the Year. We have raised the graduation rate to 93.1% for traditional schools.

We have eliminated F schools and have been recognized as an "A" rated school district for three consecutive years. We have accepted that one size fits none, offering more than 1,000 unique choice programs tailored to meet the individual interests and needs of students throughout Miami-Dade.

As I bid you farewell. I trust that the legacy our system has built will continue in earnest. All that we have achieved has been a direct result of our partnership with you as parents. I ask that you remain engaged and

continue advocating for all children.

Thank you for affording me the privilege of joining you in celebrating many of your children's milestones and successes - first days of school, award ceremonies, graduations. It is these moments I have cherished the most as the leader of this school system. Thank you for allowing me to stand alongside you during difficult times - homelessness, hurricanes, and the tragic loss of some of our children to senseless violence. It has been my honor to serve you.

HANTMAN, GALLON RETURN TO LEAD MIAMI-DADE SCHOOL **BOARD FOR 2020-2021**



Perla Tabares Hantman has been re-elected for an unprecedented fourteenth time as Chair of the Miami-Dade County School Board. Ms. Hantman, who represents District 4, was originally elected to the School Board in 1996. She is the first Hispanic woman to serve as Chair, and has previously served from 1999-2001. then each consecutive year from

2010-2015 and again from 2017 to 2021.

Dr. Steve Gallon III was re-elected as Vice Chair. Dr. Gallon, who represents District 1, was first elected to the School Board in 2016. This is his third time serving as Vice Chair.

STAY SAFE AROUND RAILROAD TRACKS AND TRAINS

Brightline, the only provider of modern, eco-friendly high-speed rail in America has resumed operations at FRA-approved and authorized top speeds of 79 miles per hour along the entire 67-mile corridor. In light of this, Brightline is reminding the public, pedestrians, motorists and cyclists to make safe choices around trains and crossings. The safety message is simple: look, listen, live. Drivers and pedestrians should obey all traffic laws around crossings and never stop on the tracks.

Pedestrians should remain alert and aware when near railroad tracks and only cross the tracks at a

designated railroad crossing. Key safety tips from Operation Lifesaver, a non-profit organization dedicated to increasing awareness about rail safety:

- The train you see is closer and faster-moving than you think.
- Be aware that trains cannot stop quickly.
- Never drive around lowered gates it's illegal and deadly.
- Do not get trapped on the tracks; proceed through a highway-rail grade crossing only if you are sure you can completely clear the crossing without stopping.
- If your vehicle ever stalls on the

tracks, get out and get away from the tracks, even if you do not see a train. Locate the Emergency Notification System sign and call the number provided, telling them about the stalled vehicle.

- At a multiple-track crossing waiting for a train to pass, watch out for a second train on the other tracks. approaching from either direction.
- When you need to cross train tracks, go to a designated crossing, look both ways, and cross the tracks quickly, without stopping. Remember it isn't safe to stop closer than 15 feet from a rail.
- ALWAYS EXPECT A TRAIN!

Any threat to Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) will be thoroughly investigated and those found responsible will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. M-DCPS remains committed to providing a safe and secure learning and work environment. Schools Police works closely with local and federal law enforcement entities to investigate these threats, which

often result in short- or long-term consequences including arrests.

We ask that you continue to speak with your child about online safety and using social media responsibly, as well as the values of honesty, integrity and responsibility.
