Tips and Resources for Parents and Families



High-Interest Reading

Encouraging your child to read books or about topics that interest them, or different kinds of reading material (graphic novels, comic books, magazines, etc.) will help develop a higher interest in reading.



Read Aloud Together

Choose high-interest materials (or reread a familiar story) and take turns reading to one another. Your child will be able to focus on building their skills with comprehension and vocabulary.



Audiobooks

To give your child a good idea of what good readers sound like, listen to audiobooks in the car on the way to school or while running errands. Use online libraries to access audiobooks you have a physical copy of at home, and have your child follow along in the print version while it is being read aloud.



Rhyming and Spelling Practice

Children with dyslexia have difficulties with rhyming and spelling. Play rhyming games with objects you see, practice spelling by incorporating motion (multi-sensory) with each letter, and use alliteration songs (Sally sells seashells..) to help your child make connections to letter sounds they may need help with.



Use rulers, highlighted reading strips, or highlight every other line of printed text to help readers focus on one line at a time to read. You can checkin after your child has read a few lines or a paragraph and ask what they remember from what they read or draw a picture showing what they just learned from the text.



Be Patient and Celebrate Small Wins

Give quick praise when your child selfcorrects when reading or a reward when they improve their reading level. Reading difficulties can cause problems across other content areas, making school harder for these children. Be patient as your child continues to build their skills.

Talk it Out or Record it

Talk through ideas and written responses before having your child write them out first. You can have your child record themselves talking out their ideas and play it back as they put pencil to paper, which will help get ideas out and build confidence.



Use Different Materials

Instead of practicing writing with pencil and paper, use other materials to practice finger writing. Sand, clay, play dough, or shaving cream can be used to practice writing letters and words and help build the mind-body connection.



Use Other Types of Paper

Regular lined paper may prove difficult to use for children with dysgraphia.
Changing the paper they are using to wide-ruled paper, graph paper, or paper with raised lines will help with letter and word alignment.





Different Writing Utensils

Find pencils and pens that have grips for written work. Pencil grips give the writer more control over the utensil, teach proper hand positioning, and improve handwriting. You can also find different types of grips that will support your child's handwriting needs.



Practice Cursive Writing and Typing Skills

Writing in cursive may be better than in print, due to the letters connecting to one another, which can remove the distraction of proper letter spacing. Your child can also be taught typing skills, with apps and programs available within the student portal, to assist in their written responses.



Build Muscle Strength and Stretch Hands Before Writing

Before your child begins writing or typing, they should stretch their hands and arms. They should shake their hands out, rotate their wrists, and wiggle their fingers. Exercise improves fine and gross motor development, posture, and overall muscle tone and will improve their writing and their muscular strength.






Use/Create Manipulatives

Some household items that can be used are beads, buttons, candy, dried pasta, and popsicle sticks. For fractions, you can use paper plates to show equal parts, equivalent fractions, and more.



Graph, Grid, and Lined Paper

Graph, grid, and lined paper can be used to help your child properly line up numbers, letters, and symbols. It is helpful when working out multiple steps to a multiplication or division problem.



Draw it Out

Drawing out math problems helps your child visualize the math operation they are working on. Your child can illustrate 3 x 5 as 3 groups with 5 stars in each group. Visual representations can be used for addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.



Graphic Organizers

Graphic organizers help break down math problems into steps. Your child can determine what's being asked in a word problem or which operation to use in a clear and organized way. Some Big Ideas Math lessons do include the use of graphic organizers to solve problems.



Review Basic Concepts and Fundamentals

A child with dyscalculia may show an understanding of a concept, but without practice, they may lose that skill over time. Review math skills in an easy way, like multiplication tables while driving to and from school or adding prices together at the grocery store.



Take Brain Breaks and Be Positive

Allow brain breaks during assignments that are more challenging to your student. Be positive, reassuring, and encouraging to your child to continue trying to learn and understand the math concept they are on.
