

ELA: From 64% to 74%


Math: From 73% to 83%

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WHAT DOES SCHOOL AND PARENT COLLABORATION LOOK LIKE?



- School and parent partnerships are built within advisory councils such as the Educational Excellence School Advisory Council (EESAC), the Title I District Advisory Council (DAC), and the Central Region Parent Advisory Council (PAC).
- Title I DAC and Region PAC members are representatives of parents who consult with the District Title I DAC on the planning and implementation of the Title I Schoolwide Program.
